# THE ROOSTER'S GROW

Psalm 13 is one of my favorite passages in the Bible. It isn't one of the most popular, isn't necessarily one of the most memorable passages, nor does it roll off the tongue like so many other verses we so often love to quote. But, if you look close enough, and read it thoroughly, you will find in it a profoundness we can apply to our daily lives. I invite you to read it before you continue.

It is only six verses, and the first four are basically a "woe is me" type of sonnet. Life has left the psalmist downtrodden, discouraged, heartbroken and lost. He feels as if God has forgotten him. He feels as if the enemy has overcome him, and he feels as if life is no longer worth the living. He cries out to God, yet receives no answer. He cries out to God, but we do not see any resolution for his condition in this passage, nor do we see any help sent to him in his situation. Then, it happens.

With no explanation, and without any crescendo within this psalm, all of a sudden, the psalmist finds peace...finds hope. In verse five, he recalls his trust in the Lord in days past, and rejoices in the memory of God's salvation in previous, similar situations. Then, he reaffirms his own faith in the present, to the point of singing praise to the Lord because the Lord has ALWAYS been good to him. In the midst of this prayer of agony, the psalmist remembers how wonderfully God has dealt with him throughout his life, and it brings him to a place of peace and hope, and even rejoicing, know that God will be faithful, yet again.

We don't know what happened next. We don't know the outcome of his situation, nor if the psalmist ever found relief from whatever it was bringing him such anguish. What we do know, is that in the midst of it all, the psalmist's attitude was transformed. In remembering how mercifully and gracefully God had dealt with him before, the psalmist was able to tap into his faith that God would act no differently in this present situation.

In a devotional by one of my favorite writer, Oswald Chambers, he states, "Let your actual circumstances be what they may, but keep recognizing Jesus, maintaining complete reliance upon Him". As Christians, emboldened by the power of Christ, we should not let our surroundings mold our atti-

tude. Rather, we should remember the faithfulness of our Lord, and allow our faith in God's goodness and mercy to transform our attitude toward those circumstances in our lives. And, whether they change immediately, or never change the rest of our days, we can have peace, knowing that God is performing a good work in us, and we can let ourselves be living examples of God's love and grace to those around us!

## WHAT IS SPONSORSHIP?

Sponsorship is the act of revisiting the Walk to Emmaus experience with the person whom God has laid on your heart. Sponsorship is one of the most important aspects of the Walk to Emmaus. Do not take its responsibilities lightly or carry them out casually or haphazardly. Sponsorship requires extensive prayer, diligent thought, and careful planning and follow-through.

The authors of *Day Four: The Pilgrim's Continued Journey* wrote, "The strength on any Emmaus community is a direct result of that community's recruiting practices". A sponsor should commit to recruiting strong church leaders in order to strengthen the local church.

For the Walk to Emmaus to be effective, individual congregations must know how to use the program. Emmaus is not a place where local church sends its problem members to get "straightened out," nor is it an evangelistic tool to "make new Christians." Emmaus is meant to strengthen church leaders...the Walk to Emmaus cannot do everything; instead it has narrowed its focus to the spiritual renewal of church leaders...Our sole purpose in recruiting new Pilgrims should be the strengthening of our own congregations.

We urge you to remember this focus as you consider sponsorship. Viewing the Walk to Emmaus as a hospital cure all the ills will weaken the community. Pray and work to strengthen and renew the church.

As sponsors, we need to follow the scriptural principles of praying, being open to God, and then calling people by name to attend the Walk to Emmaus. Remember, the Walk to Emmaus is not for everyone. Be certain that in individual you invite is right for Emmaus and that Emmaus is right for that individual.

## CONSIDER THESE THREE PRINCIPLES:

- 1. Prayer Praying is the first step in sponsorship. At this time we commit the process to God. We release to God our control, our desires, and our expectations. As we spend this time in prayer, we need to empty ourselves of self to be filled with God's instruction, God's timing, and God's person for us to sponsor.
- 2. Openness to God Our openness to God enables us to become God's instruments in furthering divine will though the Walk to Emmaus. Being open to God includes having our eyes open to see God at work. Being open to God means we listen. Time and time again, the scriptures admonish us to listen to God and God's instructions. Our openness to God allows us to receive God's instruction even when the instruction does not confirm to our expectations. Our openness to God sensitizes us as to how God wants to renew and revitalize the church using all the aspect (sponsorship included) of Emmaus experience.
- 3. Calling by Name Another aspect of sponsorship is calling individuals by name. God called people by name Noah, Abram (Abraham), Samuel, Esther, and others. Jesus also called individuals, and he called each person by name. In the Gospels we read of Jesus' calling the twelve disciples by name. Nowhere in the Gospels do we read Jesus issuing a general call for volunteers.

## THREE ASPECTS OF GOOD SPONSORSHIP:

The Upper Room Handbook on Emmaus lists three aspects of good sponsorship.

- 1. It is "the first act of agape" before a Walk ever begins.
- 2. It undergirds the whole weekend "with sacrificial love on behalf of each Pilgrim."
- 3. It is the foundation for a healthy, effective Emmaus Movement, which results in the renewal of the church.

Thus, sponsorship offers an opportunity for spiritual revitalization to individual Christians who then serve as vessels of renewal in the church, congregation, home, workplace and community. Wise sponsorship builds up the body of Christ.
